STUDENT COUNCIL:

On [March 10-12](#), the Greenfield High Student Council was attendance of the Massachusetts Association of Student Council's 33rd Annual conference in Hyannis, MA. The council brought 9 students, 2 advisers; Mariah Key, was on the State Executive Board for the 2009-2010 school year and adviser Angela Mass was on the board as well. The council was greatly honored at this event, and received numerous awards. Senior Joey George was recognized as the Western Massachusetts Unsung Hero Award, which is an award given to one student per region who excels in helping their council, but never receives recognition for doing so. Also, at this conference Greenfield was recognized as one of the two schools in Western Mass to be Gold Council of Excellence, and one of the many schools to be recognized as a Five Star Council. The Gold Council of Excellence is determined by the submitting of a book with activities the school has put on and participated throughout the year. The last award that the school won were for three students: Mariah Key, Jacob Balcanoff and Matt Beres. This award is called the Commonwealth Award and is given to up to three students per school for students who do more than their share of participation for the school and their council.

Aside from the state conference in March, the council has been very busy planning and participating in other events. On [March 18](#), the council will be participating in the middle school math night and help lead several activities. The student council was also invited to Minnechaugh High School on April 1 for a special presentation of Invisible Children, which heightens awareness of the child soldiers in Northern Uganda. On [April 29](#), the council will be making yet another trip out to Minnechaugh High School for the Spring WMASC Conference, where elections will be held for next years Executive Board, and Kyle Kendall shall be running for a position. SENIORS GET SERIOUS:

From early February to mid-March, seniors in Ms. Winn's English classes had the opportunity to participate in the Serious Play Theatre Ensemble's physical actor training program. Once a week during their regular English class hour, students were encouraged to go to the auditorium and work with the Artistic Director of Serious Play, Sheryl Stoodley, and her former student, Dan Morbyrne, who is now an Associate Artist with the ensemble. Onstage, students learned traditional and experimental theatre techniques as they worked through important scenes from Shakespeare's *Hamlet*.

"*Hamlet* is nearly impossible to understand without putting yourself in the minds of the characters," Ms. Winn believes. Winn, a 2005 GHS alumna and student teacher with the UMass Bridges to the Future program, was thrilled to give her students the opportunity to enhance their readings of *Hamlet* through unique acting experiences.

On March 19th, the seniors shared their work with a respectful audience of English classes, teachers, administrators, and faculty from UMass. They had already shared a performance with a representative from the Massachusetts Cultural Council, which funded this program through a Creative Schools Grant.

After the final sharing, some of the student performers spoke about their positive experiences with Serious Play. Theresa Gibson said that the practice of getting on stage on a regular basis helped her gain the confidence necessary for her to take on a larger role in the upcoming school play, *Knight Fever*. Katy Cominoli shared that acting out *Hamlet* can give a person a much deeper understanding of the play than one would have simply reading it in a classroom. Younger students in the audience enjoyed the performance, and some expressed interest in participating in Serious Play if there are future residencies here in Greenfield High School.

CULINARY ARTS COURSE:

Crab Rangoon

This had to have been our most popular recipe to date! It's very easy and the results were awesome. Wonton wrappers can be purchased at any Asian market. A package of 75 costs a mere \$1.79. I buy most of my stuff at Trans World Market on Rt.9 in Hadley, right next to Butterfly's Chinese Restaurant.

4 ounces cream cheese (half a package)
4 ounces imitation crab meat, chopped
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon soy sauce
freshly ground black pepper, to taste
1 scallion, finely sliced
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
16 won ton wrappers

Oil

Directions

1. Mix all well all ingredients except won ton wrappers and oil.
2. Place about 2 teaspoons of crab filling onto the center of wrapper.
3. Moisten 1/2 of the rim of the wrapper with water then fold together and seal completely.
4. Repeat until all the filling and/or wrappers are used.
5. Heat about 1/4 inch of oil in a large sauté pan.
6. Cook 4-6 rangoons on one side until golden brown. Carefully flip over and brown other side. If the rangoon browns too fast, turn down the heat. It should take 3-4 minutes per side.
7. Remove from pan, sprinkle with salt and enjoy!

8TH GRADE ENGLISH:
